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G'day, from Australia

Close your eyes and think Australia. What do you see? If you're channeling an image of Steve Irwin kicking back after a long day's crocodile hunting with an icy Foster's and shrimp hot off the barbie, keep reading. There's far more to the land down under than pop culture clichés!

Savvy tourists head to Australia for the exuberant mix of high culture and the great outdoors. For the friendly people, fantastic food and wine, cosmopolitan cities, and a chance to marvel at nature's weird and wonderful splendour.

The basics

Australia is the world's smallest continent, but sixth largest country—roughly the size of the continental US. But, that doesn't mean it's crowded. With only two people per square kilometre, Australia's population density is the lowest in the world. Most of its 20 million citizens live in cities like Sydney, Melbourne and the capital Canberra, dotted along the temperate eastern and southern coasts.

Country of contrasts

From tropical rainforests and unspoiled beaches, to rugged mountain ranges and vast tracts of desert, Australia's topography encompasses nearly every possibility, including 14 World Heritage wilderness areas.

Seasons are the reverse of the northern hemisphere, so you'll wear your bathing suit in the winter, and build snowmen in summer. Either way the outlook is sunny. Sunshine prevails an amazing 70% of possible hours over most of Australia.

History quickie

Australia's Aborigines, believed to be the world's oldest civilization, arrived roughly 40,000 years before the first European explorers in the early 16th century. *Terra Australis* was officially claimed for Britain by Captain James Cook in 1770.

In 1779, Joseph Banks (a naturalist on Cook's voyage) suggested it as a great site for a penal colony and a solution for Britain's overcrowded jails. The first ships loaded with angry prisoners dropped anchor in Botany Bay in 1787. Australia's population grew slowly until the 1850s brought the discovery of gold and a wave of new immigrants.

In 1901, the six existing colonies united to form a federated nation, bound by one parliament, one constitution, and one flag.

Fun facts

- ▶ Roughly 95% of the world's precious opals hail from Australia. But if you go to Coober Pedy, the opal capital, don't expect to see many people. Year-round temperature extremes drive most of its citizenry underground, where they live in dugouts. And as they say, it takes all kinds—the town's population is made up of over 40 different nationalities.
- ► Kangaroos, numbering 40 million, aren't the only animal unique to Australia.

 Due to its isolation, all manner of bugs, snakes, birds, insects, reptiles, snakes and mammals are found here and nowhere else.
- ► More than 70% of the world's wool comes from Australia's 140 million merino sheep.
- ► Feel like setting your cruise control? Head to the Eyre Highway at Caiguna in Western Australia. At 148 kilometres and nary a bend in the road, it's the longest straight stretch in the country, and the only paved one on the 2,700 kilometre drive from Perth to Adelaide.
- Kalgoorlie in Western Australia has the world's largest political electorate, covering a vast 2.2 million square kilometres.

The office space also grew, and due to existing facility limitations the addition has its own new engine room, power source and material handling storage and recharging areas.

Our site now boasts 307,000 s.f., four rail side load doors, the ability to easily accommodate over 200 containers in the holding area (some with electrical power connections) and—most importantly—the best warehouse crew in Texas!

Construction of the new addition, our

second expansion in four years, was driven by the phenomenal growth in existing and new customer demands, coupled with increased flow of import/export refrigerated traffic through the ever-expanding Port of Houston Container Terminal.

The happy lunchbox

Bored with the same old lunch? Want something that's healthy, yet has zip and leaves you satisfied? Try our Turkey Tantalizer Roll-Up—a fun twist on the traditional sandwich.

Just spread a whole wheat tortilla with light cream cheese and pesto sauce (you'll find the bottled kind in most supermarkets), add a few slices of turkey, and roll it up. Gourmands can toss in some thinly-sliced onion or sun-dried tomato.

Be sure and balance your box with equally healthy snacks. Try no-fuss options like a handful of nuts, a piece of fruit, or a bag of mini carrots!

Cool ideas

Challenge: How to successfully demarcate a floor with a resistant material that can survive forklift transit and be applied at -25°C, without having to heat floors or turn off rooms.

Solution: Maria Soledad Vazquez, chief of safety, hygiene and environment, Buenos Aires, came up with a 3M solution: an adhesive tape (3M Scotch 471 plastic tape; it comes in yellow, red and white) applied with a spray glue (3M Super 77 multiuse adhesive) with the help of a heating pistol similar to a hair dryer. It's clean, quick, easy and cost-effective. Three weeks later, the tape is still stuck to the cold room floors. We'll test durability further and let everyone know if the quick solution can be a medium-term solution.
